

Accommodation:


- **Tikal:** There are several lodges and guesthouses located within or near Tikal National Park, offering a range of accommodation options.

- Wildlife viewing: Tikal and Copán are located within protected rainforest areas, providing opportunities to spot monkeys, birds, and other wildlife.



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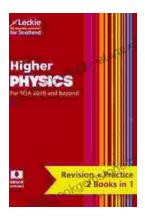






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
