
# **Quick Guide with Essential Words and Phrases for IELTS Test**

The IELTS test is divided into four sections: Listening, Reading, Writing and Speaking. Each section tests a different aspect of English language proficiency. The Listening section tests the ability to understand spoken English, the Reading section tests the ability to read and understand written English, the Writing section tests the ability to write clear and concise English, and the Speaking section tests the ability to speak English fluently and coherently.

#### Listening

#### Writing

- Vocabulary: what are the key words and phrases that need to be used in the report, summary, or essay? What is the most appropriate vocabulary for the given topic and audience?
- Grammar: what are the grammatical structures that need to be used in the report, summary, or essay? What is the most appropriate grammar for the given topic and audience?

#### **Speaking**


The Speaking section of the IELTS test consists of three parts. Part 1 is a short conversation between the candidate and the examiner. Part 2 is a monologue in which the candidate speaks on a given topic for two minutes. Part 3 is a discussion between the candidate and the examiner on a related topic. The following are some essential words and phrases for the Speaking section:

- Part 1: what is the purpose of Part 1? What are the types of questions that are typically asked in Part 1?
- Part 2: what is the purpose of Part 2? What are the steps involved in preparing for Part 2?
- Part 3: what is the purpose of Part 3? What are the types of questions that are typically asked in Part 3?
- Fluency: how can candidates improve their fluency in speaking English? What are the common mistakes that candidates make when speaking English?
- Pronunciation: how can candidates improve their pronunciation of English words? What are the common mistakes that candidates make when pronouncing English words?

The following is a list of additional tips for improving your vocabulary for the IELTS test:

- Read widely and often. The more you read, the more words you will be exposed to. Try to read a variety of texts, including newspapers, magazines, books, and online articles.

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
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
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
